Directors' Webinar discussion transcript (Feb 4, 2021):

Jennifer Coffey: Does your SPDG support the creation of modules? If so, what content do the modules cover and are they publicly available?

Teri M.: Utah has modules!

Kristen Brown (Colorado): https://www.cde.state.co.us/mtss/trainings team-driven shared leadership, data-based problem solving and decision making, family engagement, layered continuum of supports, evidence-based practices, implementation science, response to intervention, COMTSS and Individualized Education Program (IEP), and universal design for learning (UDL). First best instruction, whole child tenet outreach, school climate and condition, making data-based instructional decisions, are some of the additional topics to be added in the Online Academy in the future.

Anna Harms: Michigan: Yes, we create many learning modules. Some examples of topics include: specific resources for individuals supporting assessments, equity, intro to concepts of PBIS). Some are available only to Michigan educators and a few are available to anyone in the EduPaths platform.

Amy Gaumer Erickson: Kansas modules on Trauma-Responsive School Communities are public

Sue Daker: Sue Daker---lowa; We have modules that focus on specially designed instruction---in the areas of K-6 literacy, preschool, and significant disabilities. They are NOT publicly available at this point.

Justyn Poulos: We are planning to build MTSS Modules. Will likely be public.

martyerskine: North Carolina has units or modules for our reading and math foundational courses as well as co-teaching.

GA Karen Suddeth: We offer MTSS professional learning modules in GA.

Crystal Bethea: Arkansas-RTI modules for academic and behavior located on our state agency website. https://dese.ade.arkansas.gov/Offices/learning-services/curriculum-and-instruction/rti-academic-training-modules--participant-workbooks

Jacki Lyster: PA has online modules for Impact Coaching

Selina Merrell: MS - we do series modules as well as stand alone (PBIS, EC, SEL, SCD and UDL).

Jalee Pernol: Delaware - We are currently working on modules for MTSS and our Early Literacy Initiative. Works in process.

Stephanie VanDyke, SPDG Lead, Ohio: Ohio is currently writing modules to support a peer coaching framework. They are still in development but will be available to the public

Tom Delaney MDE: Minnesota has modules for secondary transition planning. We are revising them to better integrate pre-employment transition services

offered as part of vocational rehabilitation services through our Department of Employment and Economic Development.

Teri M.: Content in UT: MTSS overview, data-based decision making, team-based problem solving, distance learning, evidence-based professional development, high-quality instruction, supporting SWDs in MTSS. The literacy, math, behavior, and ELs modules are under revision (there are still modules on the website, but they are a bit outdated).

Young, Annette: Montana's SPDG does have 'modules' on MTSS. We house those in our LMS Moodle called the Teacher Learning Hub. Anyone can get a free account. We have a lot of topics under many categories so everything we offer on the Hub covers an area of MTSS, whether directly training on MTSS or the various layers of support for students and staff. Sydnee Seager: Utah has several modules, they are public at https://www.schools.utah.gov/curr/umtss?mid=923&tid=4 Modules include: MTSS overview, Behavior, Data based decision making, Distance Learning, Evidence-Based Professional Development, High Quality Instruction, Literacy Instruction, Mathematics Instruction, Supporting English Learners, Supporting Special Education Learners, and Team Based-Based Problem solving. A shout out to Teri Marx from AIR who has spent extensive time supporting Utah with these modules.

Peg S: Florida: We are creating some modules that review secondary content to prepare exceptional educators to feel confident in general education classrooms where they are supporting students with disabilities and/or to prepare and pass Fl Teacher Certification Exams and add the content area to their teaching certification. Regina: Virginia: We have Defusing Disruptive Behavior Modules housed with the VDOE, but we have many trainings organized in modules and the materials are organized on our website with the PPTs and materials so our districts can pick them up and use them. We have both division and school. Divisions are strand work that follow our VTSS Implementation Matrix. Specific school trainings include: Advanced Tiers, Academic-Tiered Fidelity, Effective Classroom Systems, Data Informed Decision Making, Systems Coaching Institute and New Team Training for Behavior.
